January 2011-Water Outlook for the Lake Almanor Watershed (Chester Memorial Hall)

The Almanor Basin Watershed Advisory Committee (ABWAC) is sponsoring a public presentation about potential water supply changes facing local watersheds. John Andrew of the California Department of Water Resources will present on the changing hydrology in the Sierra Nevada region, and discuss the implications for Lake Almanor and the surrounding area.

People are invited to attend to learn more about important issues for the future of our waterways and ask questions. Prior to the featured presentation, ABWAC will review its recent activities and Dr. Gina Johnston of Chico State University will give an update on the current state of water quality monitoring in Lake Almanor with the latest data.
