Oregon Senators Wyden, Merkley Cite Environmental and Economic Concerns of Expanded Warfare Training Off the Oregon Coast

Washington, DC— Echoing comments made by many Oregonians, Senators Ron Wyden and Jeff Merkley raised concerns today about the environmental and economic impacts of United States Navy's plans to expand warfare training off the Pacific coast.

"Based on a number comments we have received of from а variety of interested stakeholders and constituents. we are concerned that manv the Navv's training proposals, includina underwater minefield testina. expanded air-based exercises. explosive ordinance land and and use, widespread sonar training in particular. pose substantial environmental economic risks," the senators said in a letter to Secretary the Navy B.J. Penn.

The comment period on the Navy's plans to expand the Northwest Training Range Complex (NWTRC) ends Saturday, April 11. The proposed expansion of would training include exercises with auided missile submarines and unmanned aerial systems. The military also would implement new air and sea targets. electronic signal emitters and development new small-scale underwater training minefield.

The senators cited four specific areas of concern, including:

- The potential for irreparable harm to the fisheries and the many related industries along the Oregon Coast.
- The significant impacts of sonar on marine mammals.
- The potential impacts on endangered species.
- The potential release of a variety of hazardous materials into sensitive marine ecosystems.

"In order to avoid needlessly risking such adverse consequences, we urae methodologies the Navy to reconsider the variety of scientific studies and used support its environmental review process, to more fully explain potential environmental and cumulative impacts. to analyze all reasonable alternatives. identify harm," and to measures that may actually mitigate the senators wrote.
