

Grim Resolve on an Oil-Soaked Isle

From her perch on her utility vehicle, Leoda Bladsacker surveyed the latest heartbreak along the seven-mile beach in Grand Isle on Thursday afternoon. In a normal summer, the town and barrier island of some 1,500 people about 110 miles south of New Orleans would have been teeming with 10 times that many vacationers from elsewhere in Louisiana looking to fish and swim.

But there's nothing normal about this season.

"There's some more coming in," said Ms. Bladsacker, one of five members of the town's council, pointing toward the waves as she rode up and down the beach with a reporter. "Right there! Oh, that was a good mess of it."

Oil from the Deepwater Horizon spill started showing up about three weeks ago, she said. The tide has been depositing reddish brown gobs that now blend in with the seaweed in the sand.

The beach is not closed, but with access restricted to the balcony section away from the shoreline, no beachgoer was in sight. Instead, cleanup crews and National Guardsmen worked to keep oil at bay with containment booms and removed contaminated sand with shovels.

Ms. Bladsacker has been keeping an eye on both the cleanup and the water. "You can smell it," she said of the oil stench.

The councilwoman, who projects toughness, said she was certain that the beach community would survive.

"We're going to overcome this – don't know how or when – but we will," she said. "If there's as much oil out there as they say, we're in for the long haul, girl."

But, gazing out over the beach, she said somberly: "We lost it. Right now, it's not ours."
