Land Use,	RIPARIAN: The Land Use element states that the County should protect and maintain its native vegetation and wildlife by	
1992	adopting a grading ordinance (12-a) to retain and restore riparian vegetation (i) and protect and retain natural vegetation in	
	or near construction and road-building sites (ii). Rare and unique vegetation through appropriate zoning or management	
	prescriptions (h). The County should help prevent and stabilize streambank erosion by protect riparian vegetation (11-3a)	
	through appropriate standards in zoning ordinances (11-3b). The County is to consider preservation of any natural areas	
	that have been identified on all land use and planning decisions (8-2a). The county should support the continued use of	
	prescribed burning to improve the quality of the county's watersheds for fish and wildlife habitat (5-fr).	

Open Space/ Conservation, 1981	PLANTS: A goal of the Open Space Element is to conserve natural resources (J) by identification and conservation of representative plant communities.
Scenic Highways, 1977	LANDMARK TREES: Existing specimens and stands of trees of outstanding scenic value should be identified and preserved wherever possible (17).
Zoning Ordinance, 1992	ZONES: The Zoning Ordinance adopts rangeland, timberland, forestland, and open space zones. Forest and rangeland zones are intended (in part) for the production and harvest of natural resources. Open space is applied to lands not suited for development or to lands most valuable in their undeveloped natural state. Generally structures and significant grading shall be prohibited, but may be permitted with a minor use permit provided the structures or grading honors the open space intent.
